National Pink Shirt Day & Book Swap Day: Feb 28

The purpose of National Pink Shirt Day is to raise awareness about bullying in schools and online, as well as raise funds to support programs that foster children's healthy selfesteem.

The movement began in Berwick, Nova Scotia in 2007, a small town of 2500 people. A was bullied for wearing a pink shirt, two grade 12 students bought 50 pink shirts and encouraged their friend to wear pink. From this one kind gesture, the national Pink Shirt Day was born.

You can show your support by encouraging your children to wear pink on National Pink Shirt Day but also explaining where this story came from.

Book Swap day will also take place on February 28. Students will have the chance to trade books during school hours. Talk to your teachers about how you can donate books before the event!

Morden School Aged Programming Committee

In early January 2024, Morden School Aged Programming (MSAP) Committee conducted a survey to get a better understanding of for the local needs summer and before/after school childcare. What did they find? That there are many dual working parents who are struggling to meet ends between work and picking up children from school. The impact is not only on dual working parents but family members juggling childcare over the summer as well.

The survey was posted on Facebook page's "Morden in the Know" and received over 160 respondents. The situation has caught a great deal of public attention concerning the need for school aged programming after school hours. The community has responded by reaching out to put the story in local newspapers and the radio in the Pembina Valley region. Stay tuned for links to the story. The results of the survey will be analyzed in early February 2024.

MSAP Committee will conduct a meeting and work through action steps, hopefully for the summer of 2024. Right now, the committee is volunteer-run and will likely include fee-based programs, however, with donations, support, and sponsorship, there could be a possibility of affordable before/after school care in the years to come. The vision for this program is to have programming available on-site at École Discovery Trails, Maple Leaf Elementary School, and Minnewasta Elementary.

PAC is joining forces with teachers to implement a Children's Business Market (CBM), an event designed to give children the experience of selling and buying goods/services.

We are excited to spark a culture of creativity, innovation, teamwork, and independence through a Children's Business Market. This event was made possible by the Western School Division's generous donation of \$2,500 for the Innovation Project Grant 2023-2024.



The funds will go towards start-up fees for students, an award system, and secret shoppers but we are reaching out to parents and businesses for sponsorship, volunteering, and support to make this happen for children aged 5-17.

Hot Lunch Committee Member

Organizing lunches several times per year, coordinating between parents and local restaurants or grocery stores for orders.

Special Events Committee Member

Plan, budget, and execute outdoor activities, volunteers, order event food and drinks, coordinate rent of equipment or space, advertise, work with local businesses or entertainers, and find sponsors or donors.

Fundraising Committee Member

Raise funds to insure the financial viability and stability PAC, coordinate between committee chairs and administration.

Children's Business Market Committee Member

Expected Launch: TBD. Plan, organize, implement a market with potentially 40 vendors outdoors or indoors; coordinate with local businesses and other stakeholders for partnerships, sponsorships, and donations; collaborate with teachers and students during lunch workshops.

APPROX.4-6 HRS/MONTH

Co-Treasurer

Oversees financial all fundraising transactions and efforts going in or out of an organizing committee. Their primary duties include budget planning, financial reporting. record-keeping, and managing incoming and outgoing funds.



Administration Coordinator

Creation of meeting agenda, taking meeting minutes, organizing posters or communication all to stakeholders. responsible for email inbox managing and delegating tasks to appropriate committee members.

Health & Safety Committee Member

Promote a greater safety culture by working to help MLES and students create and maintain a safe and healthy environment through the creation of policy and procedures. Estimated volunteer commitment time: a few times per year dependent on special circumstances

Event Volunteers

The occasional helper who can commit to a few events per year these tasks range from student supervision, serving food/drinks, greeting and directing participants, set up/take down of events, issuing tickets or receipts, handing out supplies or equipment. Estimated volunteer commitment time: a few times a year, minimum 1 hour per chosen event.
